TGHS FILES LAWSUIT AGAINST CITY

n June, TGHS filed suit over the approval of a 12-unit residential project at 534 N. Kenwood St., on the site of a historic Aeroplane Craftsman built in 1913.

TGHS alleges that in approving the project despite expert, fact-based opinion that it would adversely impact the historic resource, Glendale violated the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). If TGHS prevails, the project approval would be set aside, and the City would have to prepare an **Environmental Impact Report to** identify feasible mitigation measures and analyze alternatives before it could reconsider approval.

TGHS has hired Susan Brandt-Hawley, a renowned CEQA attorney who represents public interest groups that seek to preserve historic and aesthetic resources and cultural

landscapes and enforce the laws protecting them.

On June 30, TGHS hosted a webinar to discuss the lawsuit. Former Vice President of Preservation Advocacy Catherine Jurca discussed the recent history of TGHS's preservation efforts, from getting the City to acknowledge individual properties as historic to, as in this case, urging decision makers to reject projects that threaten recognized historic resources. Former Board member Francesca Smith addressed specific problems with the Kenwood project, which include proposing to demolish the original garage and altering the setting with new development that is too tall and too close to the historic Craftsman.

Ms. Brandt-Hawley educated members about the litigation process. CEQA is enforced by citizens and public interest groups, not the State. There is no trial; a judge reviews legal briefs and hears attorneys' arguments based on the administrative record, which includes hearing transcripts and public comments. If the judge decides the City violated CEQA, the City and project sponsor are responsible for TGHS's legal costs and attorney fees. TGHS is not responsible for the City's or project sponsor's attorney fees regardless of outcome. Most CEQA cases are resolved within a year.

TGHS's case is shored up both by expert opinion about the proposed project's adverse impacts on the historic resource and by numerous public comments, which spoke to the aesthetic impacts of the project. Thank you again to everyone who submitted comments; they are hugely important!



Rockhaven's Future: Uncertain No More

n June 29, Senator Anthony Portantino (D - La Cañada Flintridge) announced the approval of his \$8 million budget request to renovate and preserve the Rockhaven Sanitarium site as the Rockhaven Mental Health History Museum. Rockhaven is listed in the National Register but has been deteriorating since 2008. TGHS is thrilled and thanks the Senator for his vision and efforts on Rockhaven's behalf.

Shortly before this announcement, TGHS's Digital Events Committee presented "Rockhaven: Gracious Past and Uncertain Future," featuring

an outstanding documentary on Rockhaven by John Newcombe, introduced by Joanna Linkchorst, the film's narrator and President of the Friends of Rockhaven. Almost 100 attendees learned about mental health pioneer Agnes Richards, who founded the sanitarium in 1923 as a facility owned and operated by women, for women. Linkchorst shared poignant stories of notable residents such as Billie Burke (Glinda in The Wizard of Oz) and Marilyn Monroe's mother, Gladys Baker Eley.

Concerned queries about Rockhaven's unsettled future dominated the lively Q&A session that followed. Thanks to Senator Portantino, that future is uncertain no more. And congratulations to the Friends of Rockhaven, which in 2019 received a Preservation Award from TGHS for their tireless work to preserve and care for the City-owned landmark.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Adaptive Reuse of Harrower Lab Moves Forward



n May, the Historic Preservation Commission approved plans for the rehabilitation of the City-owned Harrower Laboratory and Clinic property at 920 E. Broadway as affordable housing for seniors. The project includes construction

of a fourth building at the rear, and the property, already on the Glendale Register, will be nominated to the National Register of Historic Places.

Staff had recommended approval of the project as proposed, but the HPC added several conditions, including the replacement of non-original storefronts with doors more closely matching the original. For the new building, the HPC rejected the use of vinyl windows and selected a warmer color for the exterior brick veneer than the stark white originally proposed.

TGHS looks forward to a new life for this historic property, which served as Harrower's offices, manufactory and clinic until 1948. The three Beaux Arts buildings were constructed between 1921 and 1924 by prominent local architect Alfred Priest.

embers will remember TGHS's efforts to have City staff and Council recognize the historical significance of two properties at 128 and 132 S. Kenwood, following a proposal to demolish them and redevelop the site. In 2017, Council acknowledged that the Clifford Cole property, which included a 1920 Craftsman bungalow and a multi-family building from 1953, was historic for its association with the prominent local religious leader and syndicated Glendale News-Press columnist. Council refused to certify the EIR and rejected the project.

The project is back, one story taller. The applicant proposes to maintain the Craftsman at 132 N. Kenwood but demolish everything else and add 41 units. TGHS has not seen the plans; however, it is difficult to imagine that proposed new construction of this size will respect the historic character and integrity of the property.

Recognition of the Cole property was achieved thanks to committed members who wrote and spoke at the City Council meeting. It is virtually certain that TGHS will need your help again when this project returns to Council.






VIRTUAL EVENTS: TWO AUTHORS ADDRESS TGHS



n May 13, Julie (Ackerman) Anderson presented her book about her father, "The Golden Age of Hollywood Through the Lens of Joe Ackerman." The Oklahoma native moved to Glendale during WWII and ran three successful businesses, but taking celebrity photos

and collecting autographs was his passion. His huge collection, amassed over several decades, now resides at the Hollywood Museum. In 1990, as a benefit for the Alex Theatre, TGHS and then-President Andrea Humberger organized exhibits of Ackerman's photos at the Doctors House and at the Alex.



n a boffo matinee presentation direct from London on Mav 29, historian Neil Parsons, author of "Clicko: The Wild Dancing Bushman," shared the astonishing story of Franz Taibosh, whose improbable life took him from the South African bush to international prominence as a circus performer and eventually to Glendale. His home here,

during the notorious sundown era, was the earliest known extant residence of an African American who did not work where he or she lived. Architectural historian Francesca Smith then chronicled TGHS's unsuccessful 2018 campaign to save "Clicko House" from demolition.
