



## ALEX THEATRE REHABILITATION UNDERWAY

For all of us who have advocated and worked for the preservation of the Alex Theatre for the past five years, December was pretty exciting — the rehabilitation of the Alex began! On December 15th the City Council approved the building permit and the Redevelopment Agency awarded the construction contract. On the 17th, the construction barricade and trailer went up, and on the 21st, the work actually began. Since then the project has proceeded speedily with the progress apparent as each week goes by. All fixtures and seats were removed and stored, the demolition phase is complete, and construction has begun.

The Glendale Historical Society was pleased to facilitate the donation of miscellaneous items, which were not considered historically significant, from the Alex to several Los Angeles-based organizations. Damaged theater curtains and screen masking were donated to "Friends of the Orpheum"; parts of the locking rail from the rigging system were donated to Metropolitan Theatres, Inc.; and the marquee letters were donated to the Los Angeles Historic Theatre Foundation. These groups were very appreciative to receive the items, which they plan to use at downtown Los Angeles theaters and for special events.

As part of the rehabilitation project, the prominent Alex marquee and tower will be restored to their 1940 glory as designed by S. Charles Lee. One of the current challenges is to identify the original colors of the neon which was removed from the tower long ago. #### PRESERVATION ISSUES: UPDATE

Historic Preservation Element: The Historic Preservation Element of the City's General Plan, which stated the City's preservation goals and objectives and designated 33 local landmarks, has not been amended since its adoption in 1977. Preservation Planner Gerald Wasser is currently updating, expanding, and revising the document. The changes to the Element may also result in revision to the preservation ordinance which protects Glendale's landmarks. Revision of the Historic Preservation Element and the preservation ordinance will have important impacts on Glendale's cultural resources. TGHS will play an active role during the revision process to help shape these important preservation policy documents.

Goode House: Following the City's purchase of the Goode House last fall, the Department of Community Development and Housing entered into negotiations with the Crippled Children's Society (CCS) to develop the site as affordable housing for handicapped adults. Under the plan, the City will convey the property to CCS who will use Federal HUD grants and a City subsidy for the project. In October, project architect Efrain Olivares invited TGHS representatives to review preliminary plans for construction of 25 units around the Goode House which will be restored as the community center. The restoration plans are being prepared by consultant Lawrence Winans in association with architect Jai Pal Khalsa. The use of HUD funds for the project guarantees that the plans will be reviewed by the State Office of Historic Preservation for conformance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. We look forward to continuing to participate in the process and reviewing the final project plans.

New Redevelopment Area: The Environmental Impact Report (EIR) on the new San Fernando Road Corridor Redevelopment Project was recently certified. As a result of extensive input by TGHS, the Final EIR requires that a "windshield" survey of historic resources be conducted within one year and that a complete survey be completed within 5 years to document potentially significant cultural resources in the area. The goal of the surveys is to identify important cultural resources early enough in the process so that they can be preserved and incorporated into the development plans.


Deukmejian Wilderness Park: Restoration of the park's historic stone barn is scheduled to begin this spring, the first phase of the Master Plan adopted by City Council in 1992. The City purchased the property, a local landmark formerly known as Inter-Valley Ranch, in 1989. The restored barn will serve as a nature center to educate the public on the site's history.

Taylor House: The oldest frame house in Glendale, the Taylor House was constructed in 1873, according to City records. Originally located at Pacific and Glenwood, it was moved in the early 1900s to its current location at 1027 Glenwood Road. TGHS members recently toured the house which is currently for sale. Though overgrown and in disrepair, the foundation, floorboards, and roof of the original portion of the house appear stable, while later additions and the garage are not stable. Decorative features such as Craftsman paneling in the dining room, kitchen cabinetry, and stone porch piers, appear to have been added at the time the house was moved. At the time of designation in 1977 as a first order criteria landmark, the City recommended preservation and restoration of the Taylor House. We hope that the City and realtor will find a buyer for the property who will take advantage of the tax incentives available through the Mills Act to rehabilitate the historic home. #### GLENDALE'S METROLINK STATION: A PROUD BLENDING OF THE OLD AND NEW

What could be more American than balloons, politicians, music, and folks all gathered at the railway station in an election year? Well, we had all these, plus Glendale City officials, the Southern California Rail Authority, sponsoring businesses, and The Glendale Historical Society at the new Glendale Transit Center on October 26. On that day, celebrations were held marking the opening of three routes of the Southern California METROLINK commuter train network.

Four trains originating in Moorpark in Ventura County and three from Santa Clarita stop in Glendale each weekday morning on their way to downtown Los Angeles, and an equal number return in the evenings. The downtown L.A. terminus is the beautifully refurbished and upgraded Union Station. The METROLINK system is designed to reduce periphery-to-center commuter traffic on the freeways and, consequently, to reduce air pollution in the L.A. basin.

Judging from the enthusiastic morning sendoff of METROLINK from the Glendale Station, the system should prosper. The Glendale Bee Line and RTD have gone all-out to provide connections from train stations to business and manufacturing centers. With local politicians making opening statements, the spectators watched the trains come and go and enjoyed the festive atmosphere. Thanks to Dick Montgomery, Shannon Pedlow, and Sid Gordon, TGHS was represented on the opening day at the Transportation Center. Our line of merchandise and publications was on display, and informative answers were being provided to all who paused at our table.

As the TGHS newsletter reported (Vol. 11, No. 1, 1990), Glendale's venerable train station has stood the test of time and the many changes in commuter traffic in Southern California. The Spanish Colonial Revival style building has been in continuous use since its construction as a Southern Pacific Depot in 1923. It was indeed a thrill to see our handsome, neat, and tidy station still present to help usher in yet another chapter in public transit. The City of Glendale, which now owns and operates the station and which is undertaking its historic restoration, is to be congratulated for helping so effectively in this new regional endeavor. We are proud to have been present to help in the launching!

#### DEMOLITION OF PUBLIC SERVICE BUILDING UNDERWAY

TGHS representatives have continued to monitor the process preceding the demolition of the Public Service Building to insure that the mitigation measures adopted by the City in August are carried out. According to the City's Planning Division, thorough photographic and videographic documentation of the Public Service Building was completed in November. The documentation will be kept for archival purposes by the City and is available for viewing by the public. In December, asbestos was removed from the building in preparation for demolition. The distinctive exterior light fixtures and interior handrails, fixtures, and marble were also removed from the building and were placed in City storage for future use.

The demolition process, which began on January 13, will be slow, with the building being dismantled piece by piece, one floor at a time. Demolition is scheduled for completion in March, when construction of the replacement plaza will begin. The basement of the Public Service Building will remain under the plaza for functional uses related to civic center.

## TGHS TO PARTICIPATE IN DOWNTOWN STREET FESTIVAL

Glendale's upcoming street festival, "GlenFest '93" will be a three-day celebration in downtown Glendale featuring fun, food, and family entertainment. The event will be held Friday through Sunday, May 14-16 on a specially decorated section of Brand Boulevard and will include live music, puppet shows, restaurant and merchant booths, and children's entertainment at the Exchange. "GlenFest '93" is being presented by the Glendale Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the City of Glendale and community sponsors, including TGHS.

TGHS will participate by selling tickets and scrip for the event; as a nonprofit organization, we will receive back 25% of our total sales. We encourage TGHS members to attend this exciting festival and to purchase tickets from a TGHS representative. One-day passes are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children; a three-day pass is \$20, and includes a coupon for \$15 worth of food and beverage scrip. ## Spotlight on Service:

## Doris McKently

Doris McKently, born and raised in the Silverlake area, attended Marshall High and earned a BA in Art and Education from Occidental College. She taught briefly at John Muir School in Glendale and then took a seven month tour of South America before returning to teaching. In 1951 Doris and her husband Melvin built a house on a section of her family's property in the Verdugo Woodlands, which included the historic Verdugo Adobe and the Oak of Peace. Long interested in history, Doris researched the property and gave many enthusiastic tours of the Adobe which her family was carefully tending.

After teaching at Montrose Elementary School for ten years, Doris took a break to raise her three children and then taught at R.D. White for 20 years. Doris and Melvin joined TGHS in the early 1980s and helped with fundraising efforts for the restoration of The Doctors' House. They also served as docents for TGHS tours of Tropico, the Masonic Temple, and stone houses. Doris has been a Doctors' House docent since 1989, leads weekday tours for local school groups, and has trained new docents. She contributes to many TGHS events by playing the piano and attends public hearings on important preservation issues.
