TGHS "SPRINGS" INTO ACTION

Spring has arrived, and with it some "spring cleaning" and some "spring planting" by the board and active members of our organization.

Special plans are underway to plant a small citrus grove adjacent to the Doctors' House in honor of the family of recently departed Treasurer, Dick Montgomery. Isabelle Myers, Curator of the Doctors' House Museum, engineered the first part of this remarkable feat seemingly overnight, and was assisted in this effort by our sister organization, Glendale Beautiful, which arranged for the trees to be purchased and dedicated for Arbor Day in March. Many members helped contribute to the purchase of the three trees, and we thank them. The grove will be planted in May.

Another special thanks goes to Emily Wargo's cleaning crew who gathered in March to give the Doctors' House its annual spring spiffing up. Our office at the Goode House will soon be getting similar attention. Our administrator, Mary Reed, is recruiting a small group of local high-school students to dust and sort through piles of documents and old office supplies cluttering up the Good House office. The Board is very pleased to announce that TGHS member Rosemarie Ibanez has graciously agreed (with some trepidation, but much enthusiasm) to serve as the liaison between TGHS, local government officials, and other organizations, in the area of historic preservation. Rosemarie has served on TGHS' former Preservation Advocacy Committee. Her professional background and training is in urban planning and she works for the City of Los Angeles. I know all our members appreciate her willingness to assist us in our preservation activities.

Speaking of preservation.....I have been honored to represent TGHS at a number of meetings with city officials and concerned residents recently, providing input on ways to preserve three important structures in Glendale beloved to our members and to the wider community: Brand Library, the stone barn (officially named "Le Mesnager Vineyard Ranch), and the Adams Square Building (less officially, but better-known as "the pink building.") Plans for saving and enhancing these structures are underway, in various stages, and we at TGHS can be very pleased that the City has recognized our organization's importance by keeping our officers "in the loop." As these projects progress, I will report more on them.

TGHS LECTURE SERIES CONTINUES By: Dr. Robert Newcomb

<u>January</u>

The TGHS Lecture Series has continued to have wonderful speakers which have informed and entertained those attending. Just within the waning shadow of Y2K, the Society met on January 5 and shared an evening with David L. Smith who talked about "Glendale: Those Formative Years." David, who has been a member of the Society for many years as well as having serviced on its Board of Directors, strikingly combined two threads of local history for one instruction.

David's family history in rural Nebraska goes back several generations, and the old school-house does, in fact, bear the initials of three generations of his family carved into schoolroom desks! The Old School House is now a museum of the community's local history. With this background in mind, David coupled it with his deep knowledge of the local history of the community and City of Glendale over the span of nearly a century. His frequent appearances a guest lecturer on this topic and his research into the participation in local neighborhood walks all have equipped him to speak knowledgeably about Our Town.

For the January 5 evening, he skillfully interwove the two threads of One Family's History as a reflection of societal growth, incorporation, and flowering into a vital community and city. Many of the same processes and phases of growth and development which can characterize a single family over time may also be obtained from the record of urban growth and development which is found in the many written, oral, and recorded images which are held as treasures in archives, libraries, and the memories of individual people. All in all, David Smith shared with us a delightful and memorable evening.

February

The February 5, 2000 meeting attracted the largest crowd to attend any of our recent membership meetings. About 120 folk took their seats, using every available chair in the auditorium at the Boy Scout Service Center. As someone noted, if the program topic concerns planes, trains or automobiles, then you can be assured of a record turnout, and such was the case this evening.

The Society and its guests met to hear Thom Eberhardt discuss the background of his project designed to illustrate "When Glendale Ruled the Skies!" This was the saga of the Grand Central Airport which came and went as a major air transportation and support facility right here in Glendale during the first half of the Twentieth Century.

For The Friends of the Library, a support group for the Glendale Library System, Thom has put together with talented resources a 38 minute-long video about Grand Central Airport. In this production he used still photos, movie footage, and live interviews with people who had personal memories of the Airport. It was particularly touching to see our dear, departed Society member, Richard Montgomery, on the screen while telling his childhood recollections of the facility and its flying machines.

Thom Eberhardt's Video and his presentation were indeed a smash-hit, and the entire, large audience present vastly enjoyed it and had questions and some answers afterwards when we broke into the informal portion of the evening's program. (Continued on Page 5)

The past year has been a busy one for our museum. Besides our usual events, I spent much of the year researching this year's Glendale Public School exhibit. I went as far as Sacramento to search the State archives for Superintendent of School reports from the turn of the century to document the growth of local schools over a period of 123 years. I would encourage you to visit the museum and enjoy the result of assembling memorabilia from different Glendale schools. For many of you, this will bring back memories of school days in our city.

We are seeing a steady stream of third-grade classes take advantage of the opportunity to learn about Glendale's past by seeing our exhibit, and have added old-fashioned outdoor fun to our school tours. We could use additional week-day docents to cope with the increased number of school tours, so if you or anyone you know may be a candidate, please let me know. Each docent only gives 2 hours per month, so it's not a time-consuming commitment.

We began this year with our traditional docent tea, an opportunity for our docent guild to socialize and discuss upcoming events. Soon after, we added five new docents to our roster: Annette Allison, Brook Applegate, Joan Morris, Jenny Ruiz and Bonnie Tortorelli.

This year's Valentine's Day dinner raffle raised bout \$700 for our group. Thanks to all of you who purchased tickets. Our winner was TGHS member, Valerie Howard, and we are once again indebted to La Fontana Restaurant for the delicious dinner they donated.

Our next event is an all-time first and it is very exciting. We are cooperating with the Jewel City Doll Club (who furnished the playroom many years ago) to stage a doll-sharing event in and around the Gazebo on May 21, 2000 from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. The event is free, but we will be selling refreshments. Also on exhibit will be the personal doll collections of some Jewel City Doll Club members throughout the house. We hope to attract both old and young to this fun day in the park and invite you all to bring your favorite doll to share.

This September sees the 20th Anniversary of the Relocation of the Doctors' House to Brand Park and we have reserved the Gazebo for a special celebration. Our board is open to suggestions on how we should celebrate this mile-stone. So far, a parade of old cars along the moving route and a relay of walkers has been suggested and we would love to get your input, as well. I have assembled a list of 400 volunteers, donors and docents who have contributed to making the Doctors' House a success and we hope to immortalize their names on a memory quilt made for us the Glendale Quilt Guild.

At the end of the year, we will once again hold our very successful Candlelight Tours, which have become a holiday tradition to which many Glendalians look forward. Last year's attendance was an all-time record (550 visitors on two nights) and we will continue offering this wonderful de-stressing event.

After consulting with Glendale Parks & Recreation, we have set aside an area at the back of the Doctor's House, where Glendale Beautiful will plant three citrus trees (one donated by Andrea Humberger) and two by TGHS) with a memorial plaque for the Montgomery family. This will allow out-of-state visitors to the museum to pick a lemon or an orange (a BIG DEAL when you live in colder climates!), while creating a lasting memorial to Dick, Natalie and Craig Montgomery, who were (Continued on Page 5)
