Historic Districting Update,

Like the summer weather, Glendale's historic districting movement is heating up! We have addressed City Council, and the Planning Commission as well as maintained an ongoing dialog with the Historic Preservation Commission. We have repeatedly emphasized publicly that our biggest obstacle to district creation continues to be "The 100% consent requirement". The current City Ordinance requires 100% consent from all homeowners to establish a Historic District, making it virtually impossible to create Historic Districts in Glendale. TGHS has redrafted the current City Ordinance to include, in addition to the desirable "simple majority (i.e., 51%) consent, an outline of how to apply for, review, and maintain a historic district within Glendale. This new draft Ordinance includes a provision for each district formed to establish a Preservation Plan under which changes to historic structures will be assessed. This approach is similar to that taken in many other municipalities in Southern California. The Ordinance rewrite has been distributed to City Planning Staff as well as the Planning and HP Commissioners and is under review. We have also distributed a copy of the Cumberland Heights-specific Preservation Plan to the same individuals and City Council Members. More public outreach is expected in the future. As of this writing, a date for Council to vote on an Ordinance amendment has not been set but the TGHS Historic District Committee is working hard to press for a revised Ordinance with relaxed consent requirements to be placed on the City Council's agenda for adoption.

In other news, the historic districting committee is actively promoting TGHS and our historic districting initiative throughout the city:

Glendale. Over 30 neighbors attended and
signed our petition to create Cumberland

also gained several new enthusiastic members.

- At the end of June, we have obtained signatures from just over 25% of the 500 homes in the proposed Cumberland Heights district.

We have received considerable support for historic districting throughout the city, and TGHS has had a significant increase in its membership, and financial contributions as a result of our efforts. Based on all this support, it appears that the preservation winds are beginning to shift in our favor and we have a real shot at changing the entire climate of Glendale with respect to historic preservation! We knew it wasn't going to be easy create Historic Districts in Glendale, but it will be all that more sweet when we succeed! The display will hang in the Doctors' House parlor for one year.

For the proper Victorian lady who wished to give hair sculpting a try, women's periodicals of the day provided instructions on how to craft these unique mementoes. For those not artistically inclined, the hair could be sent to a professional "hair spider", who would render a work of art for a hefty sum of money. This custom probably seems very odd to you, but we'd like to encourage everyone to open your minds and come to the Doctors' House to learn about yourself and our past as you view an obscure art form that illustrates beautifully how different our sentiments are from those of our forebears.







Adams Square Fest and Dedication on June 15th starts what TGHS hopes will be a historic preservation movement in that area of Glendale

On July 15th the long awaited dedication of the newly revitalized Adams Square --complete with Deco-reminiscent water fountain, newly planted foliage, and park benches - took place. The Adams Hill area is ripe for a historic districting movement in our opinion, as it is an eclectic mix of people and period architecture. Some of Adams Hill's residents are themselves living icons of local history. Arlene Vidor, TGHS President, commented, "Many locals visited the TGHS booth at the June 15th Fest and expressed a desire to see the neighborhoods superb collection of period homes and commercial structures protected from inappropriate remuddeling.* Interest was also expressed in conducting oral histories for the Adams Hill area."






TGHS Members John and Betty Albu own this Adams Hill 1927 Spanish Revival house. They bought it in 1987 because of its castle like battlement lookout, arching windows, and terraced pine and cypress-laden mountain garden. They say it reminded them of their native Hungary. The idea to nominate their house to the Glendale Register came to them after attending the TGHS Public Forum on Preservation of Character Homes last year. The Albu's have added Spanish tiles to the fireplace and stairs, and the fixtures, wood floors, and windows are original. These exemplary architectural details are among those that qualified the house for landmark status.


Fidelity Federal Bank Building

(225 E Broadway)

City staff plans to conduct a tour of the building for concerned stakeholders, including TGHS officers. The Glendale Redevelopment Agency (GRA) is deciding whether to pursue demolition to make way for mixed use or residential apartments. The Glendale Historical Society advocates for preservation of and adaptive reuse of this unique

building, preferably for cultural purposes, such as an Animation Museum. At a recent GRA meeting it appeared as though Councilman Frank Quintero favors adaptive reuse, but we are unsure about the positions of the other Council Members at this time. Grand Central Air Terminal Building (1310 Air Way)

Disney, which owns the site of Southern California's first airport, has promised to rehabilitate the building. However work on the Air Terminal site is not planned for the early phases of their 25-year plan for the "Grand Central Creative Campus". An interim exhibit on

the Air Terminal will be unveiled in August at Glendale's Central Library. This exhibit will be permanently installed on-site once the Air Terminal has been restored. TGHS is monitoring this project and would like to recruit aviation buffs and fans of the terminal to help us advocate for complete and expeditious restoration of the terminal. 


USC School of Architecture: Summer Program in Historic Preservation

The School of Architecture at the

University of Southern California is having its tenth annual summer program of short courses devoted to the conservation of our cultural heritage. This program offers fifteen days of classes with noted experts from Southern California and the United States, which, taken together, are intended to act as a general introduction to the field of historic preservation. In addition to examining the history and philosophy of the preservation movement as it has evolved during the past century, lectures and field trips to historic sites throughout the Los Angeles area will introduce students to a broad range of legal, economic, aesthetic and technical issues associated with the documentation, conservation and interpretation of historic structures, landscapes and communities. Among sites to be visited and studied are the Gamble House, Hollyhock House, Rancho Los Alamitos, Schindler House, and the Getty Conservation Institute. This course has been designed for students, design professionals, community leaders, established preservationists, planners and developers seeking to place their practice within a contemporary context.

include community and neighborhood leaders, public officials,


affordable housing practitioners, architects, planners, historic site managers, developers, downtown revitalization specialists and other grassroots activists.

The theme of National Preservation Conference 2002, Cities, Suburbs and Countryside, focuses on preservation-based revitalization of downtowns, inner-city neighborhoods, and older suburbs, as well as proactive strategies to protect and rejuvenate surrounding countryside. Selected sessions will focus on cutting-edge strategies and models drawn from across the country. Field sessions will explore the sophisticated work being done in the Cleveland area. Attention will also be focused on broader strategies, such as Smart Growth models, that bring together the interests of cities, suburbs and countryside to address issues affecting them all.

The historic preservation story in Cleveland starts with the wrecking ball and ends with some of the best preservation-based housing, theater development, and adaptive use projects in the country.

In Memorium - Dr. Bob Newcomb

Dr. Robert Newcomb, a long time TGHS Officer and Board Member - and a legendary Doctors' House preservationist and docent, died of cancer on April 29, 2002. Dr. Newcomb was "The Doctor" on the Doctors House tour over many years, a role he relished. He also organized a very special series of monthly lectures on local lore and history for TGHS' Members.

Many people do not know that after graduating from Stanford and taking a PhD in geography at UCLA, "Dr. Bob" served in US Naval Reserve Air Intelligence as a Lt. Commander. He and his late wife, Karen Hale Newcomb, also enjoyed a 12-year stint living in Denmark. Everyone he came in contact with remembers Dr. Newcomb as a classic gentleman and scholar who has always been thoughtful, generous, beloved and admired. We will miss him so very much.

"Dr. Bob" was extremely generous to The Glendale Historical Society Endowment Fund in life as in death. This fund is administered by The Glendale Community Foundation.
