

WELCOME!

On behalf of the Board of Directors of The Glendale Historical Society, I am pleased to present this 2019 Calendar of Events as we launch our 40th Anniversary year. From signature events such as our annual Home Tour and Taste of Spain soirée to walking tours of our beautiful, character-filled neighborhoods, we have assembled this year-long planner to help you explore Glendale's history and its notable architecture through a variety of tours, educational activities, programs, lectures and special events at historic places.

The Glendale Historical Society got its start in 1979 when a group of concerned residents came together to save the Doctors House – one of the city's last two remaining Queen Anne-Eastlake style homes – from demolition. They moved it to Brand Park and undertook the heroic effort of restoring the Victorian house to its former glory. Today, The Glendale Historical Society continues in that same spirit as a dynamic, all-volunteer, nonprofit organization with approximately 750 members that works to celebrate and preserve Glendale's rich and diverse history and architectural heritage through advocacy, education and outreach.

Forty years of preservation, through collaborative efforts with city officials and staff, neighborhoods, property owners and other organizations, have resulted in establishing and strengthening Glendale's preservation ordinances, saving a number of important buildings from demolition, the designation of more than 100 historic landmarks and the creation of seven historic districts with three more in process.

We are proud to have – through lectures, tours and publications – kept alive the stories of how Glendale came to be and grew into the community it is today. Our focus has not only been on the well-known touchstones like the Verdugo family, L.C. Brand, Hubert Eaton, the Pacific Electric Railway and Grand Central Air Terminal, but also on others, less well-known, who played a role in the story of Glendale: people like Fanny Briggs Carr, creator of a popular cosmetics line; Alfred F. Priest, the architect who designed many of the buildings constructed in downtown Glendale in the 1910s and 1920s; and Piedad Yorba Sowl, proprietress of the Casa Verdugo restaurants. We will continue to find and share the stories of Glendale, with a special effort to bring forth stories of people and communities often overlooked.

While we take time to reflect on four decades of accomplishment (see pages 15 through 18), as well as a few disappointments, it is essential that we continue to look ahead and remain focused on the issues we need to tackle now and in the future as well as celebrating all aspects of Glendale's history and architectural heritage.

I hope you enjoy the events that we have planned for the year ahead, and I look forward to seeing you soon.

Established in 1937 and originally located on Central Avenue until it moved to Brand Boulevard in 1980, Damon's has remained a much-loved local institution. A single palm tree rooted in the middle of the original Damon's restaurant inspired the tropical décor and the rest, as they say, is history. We are also thrilled that plans are underway to recreate Damon's original windblown-palm neon sign (1937-1980).

Meet us in Montrose! The lively color scheme and vintage feel of Montrose Bowl create a perfect atmosphere for a nostalgic Raising the Bar – plus bowling! Offering eight usable vintage bowling lanes, a bar with red vinyl stools and booths, a jukebox and plenty of party space,

Montrose Bowl is frequently used for the filming of major motion pictures, indie films, TV shows and commercials, as well as private parties. The fabulous fifties décor was adopted in 1998, when the fantasy comedy-drama "Pleasantville" was shot there. After production wrapped, the owners asked the crew to leave the set just as it was. More recently, "My Latin Lover" and "Jersey Boys" were shot at Montrose Bowl. Montrose Bowl opened in 1936 and has been owned and operated by the Berger family since 1981. No RSVP required.

Los Angeles Historian and S. Charles Lee aficionado Eric Lynxwiler will give a captivating presentation on the legendary theatre architect who, in 1940, re-designed the Alex Theatre's façade into a fabulous Art Deco/Moderne neon masterpiece. Lee's other notable projects

include the Tower Theatre (1927) and the lavish Los Angeles Theatre (1931) in Downtown L.A.

Lynxwiler's talk will be followed by an exclusive architectural and backstage tour of the Alex Theatre. Built in 1925 and designed by architects Charles R. Selkirk and Arthur G. Lindley, the Alexander Theatre, as it was originally known, features Greek and Egyptian motifs and is listed on the Glendale Register of Historic Resources (No. 20), as well as the National Register of Historic Places.

Do you own an architecturally significant building? Did someone important live or have a business there? Come find out how to list your property on the Glendale Register of Historic Resources, which helps to ensure that exceptional Glendale residential, commercial and industrial buildings are preserved for future generations. Glendale Register properties and "contributors" to historic districts are also eligible for the Mills Act, a property tax reduction (usually around 50%), which is more valuable now than ever given recent changes to federal tax law that limit the amount of State income and property tax deductions. 


opportunity to learn practical information from a variety of sources to maintain and restore the original charm and character of older properties while still meeting the needs of modern living.

The Expo will be held at the Glendale Civic Auditorium, a Great Depression-era Works Progress Administration-funded project. The 1938 building was designed by architect John A. Grundfor in a distinctive Spanish Colonial Revival and Moorish-influenced style. Last year, TGHS successfully nominated the building to the California Register of Historical Resources for its direct association with the 20th-century development of Glendale.

Built in 1892 by Henry C. Banker, it was the home of Edgar D. Goode and his wife, Alletia, from 1897-1917. Goode played a significant role in Glendale's incorporation and early development.

TGHS was instrumental in saving this Victorian gem from demolition and ensuring that it be preserved in its original location. The house serves as the community center for the surrounding lyy Glen Apartments.

Glendale has a number of significant homes designed by the most celebrated and influential architects of the last century, including Gerard Colcord, A. Quincy Jones, Pierre Koenig, John Lautner, Richard Neutra, Rudolph Schindler, Lloyd Wright and Paul R. Williams.

In advance of this year's *Icons of Architecture* Home Tour, State Historical Resources Commissioner Alan Hess will talk about these and other noted architects and the impact they have had on each other and residential design. Hess, owner of Alan Hess Architecture since 1981, has written 20 books on Modern architecture and urbanism in the mid-20th century.

Hess's presentation will take place at Glendale's Downtown Central Library, a 1973 Brutalist-style building designed by the prominent architectural firm Welton Becket and Associates. Moore, who won the American Institute of Architects' prestigious Gold Medal award.

At each location, tourgoers will be met by a docent who will speak about the church's architectural details and provide a brief history. Join us for a unique opportunity to learn more about these places of worship.

Restoring Tomorrow

Restoring Tomorrow tells the tale of Los Angeles' Wilshire Boulevard Temple, which was built in 1929 by the original Hollywood moguls. With its towering ten-story-high dome, it ranks with the Chinese Theater and Griffith Planetarium as one of the great L.A. landmarks, but by the 21st century it was in need of tens of millions of dollars of reconstruction to avoid the wrecking ball. Film critic Leonard Maltin calls it "a genuinely inspiring film with a great story to tell that I found very moving." This against-all-odds story is told through the personal journey of director Aaron Wolf who, like so many of his generation, had become disaffected from his congregation. In chronicling the Temple's restoration, he finds himself restored, as he reconnects to his synagogue and his community. In these divided times, Restoring Tomorrow ultimately demonstrates how, when any community puts its mind to it, people can be brought back together, no matter what culture or religion.

Experience a movie that is about preservation and also much more. The filmmaker grew up in Glendale and is enthusiastic about this return engagement in his home town. Celebrate the season at our annual holiday party at the Brand Library and Art Center, which is the former home of Leslie C. Brand and his wife, Mary Louise.

Brand, an important early developer of Glendale, built this mansion in 1904 and named it "El Miradero." His brother-in-law, Nathaniel Dryden, designed the home based on the East Indian Pavilion built for the 1893 Columbian World Exposition held in Chicago, which Brand had visited. The Saracenic architecture, with crenellated arches, bulbous domes and minarets, combines characteristics of Spanish, Moorish and Indian styles.

Brand bequeathed the house and property to the City to be used as a public park and library. The addition of a compatible and differentiated art center building, designed by Glendale architects Raymond Jones and Charles Walton, was dedicated in 1969.

The Brand Library and Art Center, which underwent a major restoration and rehabilitation in 2014 and garnered a TGHS Preservation Award, is listed on the Glendale Register of Historic Resources (No. 7) as is the El Miradero Gateway (No. 121).

Civic Center Walking Tour

In 2014, The Glendale Historical Society and the City of Glendale's Historic Preservation Commission organized a walking tour of Glendale's civic center campus. The tour features 21 notable properties, including a mix of municipal buildings, religious institutions, homes and businesses, that tell the story of Glendale's history, growth and civic development.

Doctors House Museum Tours

Built around 1888, the Doctors House (Glendale Register No. 6) is a Queen Anne-Eastlake style Victorian home that was occupied in succession by four doctors, which gave the house its name. Subsequently, silent screen star and filmmaker Nell Shipman lived in the house from 1917 to 1920 with her family and a menagerie that included two bear cubs.

Docent-led half-hour tours of the Doctors House Museum are offered Sundays from 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm with the last tour at 3:30 pm. The Museum is closed on Sunday holidays including: Easter Sunday, Mother's Day and Father's Day. Closures also occur during the month of July. December tours are only held 6:30 pm – 8:30 pm on the second and third Saturdays of the month. Rainy weather may cause Museum closures.

	Led by Carole Dougherty, The Glendale Historical Society incorporates as a non-profit organization to mobilize support for Doctors House and other preservation efforts
→	City Council agrees to donate area of Brand Park for Doctors House new location
→	Efforts begin to encourage developers to preserve Jensen's Palace Grand Shops aka Jensen's Arcade/Egyptian Village Café (1921)
1980 →	Marie Luft elected first TGHS President; Carole Dougherty named Vice President
→	Doctors House moved in two sections to Brand Park



1988 →	TGHS advocates for preservation of Goode House and its eligibility for the National Register; City agrees to impose conditions that Goode House be restored
→	City of Glendale becomes Certified Local Government, indicating commitment to a professionalized preservation program
1989 →	TGHS and Associates of Brand Library and Art Center sponsor lecture series on house restoration and research
→	City buys 702-acre Intervalley Ranch/Winery property (renamed Deukmejian Wilderness Park), which includes Le Mesnager Barn (1915)

→	Alex Theatre appears in October 1989 issue of <i>Life</i> magazine as "101 things worth saving"
